Detailed Description of Major Assignments:

Discussion Board Posting	On the discussion board, there are 12 activities/questions/postings for you to
Exercises	complete and post your findings/conclusions. Each posted response is worth 5 points. Each response should give detailed examples, cite the textbook (including author and page number), be 5-7 sentences long, and be grammatically correct. You cannot get credit if you use the same example as a classmate or one that's listed in the textbook. Do not start a new thread; responses in new threads will not be graded. The discussion board responses are worth 30% of your grade combined. The due dates are listed on the schedule. Every assignment is due at 11pm. I cannot accept it if it is 11:01pm or later. Prepare accordingly.
Class Participation	You are expected to read and respond to your classmates' discussion board posts 6 times (for 5 points each). To get credit, you must name the classmate(s) to whom you are responding. Your class participation grade is worth 15% of your grade. There are no due dates for the responses to your classmates' posts, but they must be done by December 1st at 11:00pm to get course credit.
Exams	You will have one exam for every three chapters. Each exam is worth 25 points. You will have 120 minutes to take each exam, and 2 attempts. Combined, the exams are worth 50% of your grade. They must be completed by the date listed on the syllabus by 11:00pm.
Who am I?	In this posting you will demonstrate who you are to the class. Reply to the appropriate discussion board thread by the due date, August 25, 2016 at 11:00pm. Do not create a new thread. You will be graded on your ability to articulate who you are in a creative, clear, and concise way. Feel free to respond

to your classmates' postings as well. You should give detailed examples, your post should be 5-7 sentences long, and be grammatically correct. As a part of
your response, feel free to answer any of the following questions: Where are you
from? Why did you choose to come to college? Why are you at PV? What are
your interests? Skills? Goals? Late responses will not be accepted.

Course Procedures Taskstream

Taskstream is a tool that Prairie View A&M University uses for assessment purposes. One of your assignments will be considered an "artifact," an item of coursework that serves as evidence that course objectives are met. Submission of Assignments:

Submission of Assignments: ALL discussion board postings and exams must be submitted/completed via eCourses by their specified date and time. Make sure you pay attention to the dates assignments are due so that you do not miss exams or your online presentation. Postings and tests submitted after 11:00pm will not be graded.

Make-up and Late Work: NO MAKE-UP OPTIONS ARE PROVIDED. I do not accept late work under any circumstance. I will not accept late assignments, presentations, exams or discussions under any circumstance. A note about online courses: To be successful in this class, you must keep up with your assignments, reading, and tests. This includes buying the book on (or before) the first day and reading each chapter as it is assigned. There is a link to purchase the textbook on eCourses. You can work ahead, but you will not get credit for work turned in late. It is also strongly recommended that you type and save all assignments in Word before copying and pasting them into the forum on eCourses. This will allow you to check grammar, spelling, and ensure you have a backup copy if eCourses has unanticipated issues. You are still responsible for posting assignments by 11pm.

Exam Policy

Communication Expectations and Standards:

Emails or discussion postings will receive a response from the instructor, usually in less than 48 hours. Urgent emails should be marked as such. Check regularly for responses.

Discussion Requirement:

Online courses often require minimal to no face-to-face meetings. However, conversations about the readings, lectures, materials, and other aspects of the course can take place in a seminar fashion. This will be accomplished by the use of the discussion board. The exact use of discussion will be determined by the instructor.

It is strongly suggested that students type their discussion postings in a word processing application and save it to their PC or a removable drive before posting to the discussion board. This is important for two reasons: 1) If for some reason your discussion responses are lost in your online course, you will have another copy; 2) Grammatical errors can be greatly minimized by the use of the spell-and-grammar check functions in word processing applications. Once the post(s) have been typed and corrected in the word processing application, it/they should be copied and pasted to the discussion board.
