Detailed Description of Major Assignments:

Exams: The exams are <u>closed book</u> exams with multiple choice and short answer questions. It is the student's responsibility to make sure that he or she takes examinations as scheduled. <u>No make-up is available</u>. There are three exams, 100 points each.

Company Analysis Each student will be assigned a company to evaluate. The evaluation should be completed individually according to guidelines provided.

Presentation The presentation is a group project, and the material used for the speech will come from the Company analysis of a company assigned to a group.

Communication Expectations and Standards:

Emails or discussion postings will receive a response from the instructor, usually in less than 48 hours. Urgent emails should be marked as such. Check regularly for responses.

Discussion Requirement:

Online courses often require minimal to no face-to-face meetings. However, conversations about the readings, lectures, materials, and other aspects of the course can take place in a seminar fashion. This will be accomplished by the use of the discussion board. The exact use of discussion will be determined by the instructor.

It is strongly suggested that students type their discussion postings in a word processing application and save it to their PC or a removable drive before posting to the discussion board. This is important for two reasons: 1) If for some reason your discussion responses are lost in your online course, you will have another copy; 2) Grammatical errors can be greatly minimized by the use of the spell-and-grammar check functions.
