Course Procedures and Policies

Attendance/Participation

You are expected to be in class, however, if you miss, <u>you</u> will be responsible for all material covered in the class during the day(s) you missed. I will not give out copies of my notes, nor give private lectures in my office. You must get the notes from another student in the class. Students should be prepared to discuss the readings assigned for that day and are encouraged to ask questions to jumpstart discussion about topics. Multiple absences means you are not able to participate, and this will negatively affect your score; you cannot participate if you are not in class. Attendance will be part of your participation score, and you will receive full credit for coming to class only when you are <u>ON TIME</u>. Absence for an exam will only be excused for a verifiable family or medical emergency, a <u>serious</u> transportation problem, or participation in an official University activity. More than 3 unexcused absences may result in a full letter grade reduction. Excused absences are tabulated the same as being present. All excuses MUST be provided beforehand or within 24 hours after the absence (except for <u>documented</u> extenuating circumstances).

Two Brief Source Analyses

Each student will write two short papers (2-3 pages) analyzing historical documents. There will be two handouts describing the details of the assignments.

The papers are due on Sundays, **3 MARCH** and **14 APRIL**. Any paper handed in after 11:59pm on the due date is a late paper. All papers will be turned into eCourses and checked by Turnitin.com. You do not need to turn in a hard copy. A late paper will be docked 10% per day after the due date. Plagiarism, use of word mixer website or software, Al, or any other form of academic dishonesty will result in an automatic F for the paper. If you would like for me to look at a rough draft, please get it to me at least 2 days before the due date. Further instructions will be given on eCourses when the assignment is posted.

Term Paper

Each student will write a paper which examines the primary source readings and (if possible) the class discussions. Students should attempt to address some aspect of ancient Rome that they find particularly interesting. I will distribute a handout with possible paper ideas.

The paper is due on **TUESDAY**, **7 MAY**. Any paper handed in after 11:59pm on the due date is a late paper. As stated above, all papers will be turned into eCourses. You do not need to turn in a hard copy. Because the term paper is due at the end of the semester, I will not accept late term papers. Plagiarism, use of word mixer website or software, or any other form of academic dishonesty will result in an automatic F for the paper. If you would like for me to look at a rough draft, please get it to me at least 2 days before the due date. Further instructions will be given on eCourses when the assignment is posted.

A review of the material for each exam will be conducted in the last class session before the exam. I will also distribute a study guide a week or so before each exam.

What does the grade on my paper mean in Dr. Baughman's class?

A Excellent work in all respects.

- (90-100) Thesis is clear; material is synthesized from multiple sources and incorporated into a well-organized argument. Paper engages the question on a sophisticated level and contains few errors and omissions. Writing is grammatically and stylistically correct, and reflects a deep comprehension and critical understanding of the issues. Citations are correctly formatted.
 - B Very fine work.
- (80-89) Well above average in both analysis and writing. Student has engaged the material and demonstrated a critical understanding of the issues. Thesis is apparent, and material is synthesized from multiple sources. Writing contains errors in grammar and punctuation or minor omissions of content. Citations may be incorrectly formatted in places.
 - C Solid and satisfactory work.
- (70-79) Paper reflects understanding of material, but some areas of concern with clarity, organization, interpretation, or use of historical evidence. Writing could be improved by careful proofreading. Citations are incorrectly formatted in a number of places.
 - D Below average.
- (60-69) Analysis of content reflects lack of commitment or lack of critical understanding of material. Writing contains errors unacceptable for college-level work. Thesis typically absent or unsupported. Analysis fails to incorporate historical evidence; problems with organization and/or interpretation. Citations are incomplete and/or incorrectly formatted. Conference with Dr. Baughman highly recommended.
 - F Unacceptable.

University Rules and Procedures

Academic Misconduct

Academic dishonesty is defined as any form of cheating or dishonesty that has the effect or intent of interfering with any academic exercise or fair evaluation of a student's performance. The college faculty can provide additional information, particularly related to a specific course, laboratory, or assignment.

You are expected to practice academic honesty in every aspect of this course and all other courses. Make sure you are familiar with the *University Administrative Guidelines on Academic Integrity*, which can be found on the <u>Academic Integrity</u> webpage. Students who engage in academic misconduct are subject to university disciplinary procedures. As listed in the *University Administrative Guidelines on Academic Integrity*, the University Online Catalog, and the Student Code of Conduct, the following are examples of prohibited conduct. This list is not designed to be all-inclusive or exhaustive. In addition to academic sanctions, any student found to have committed academic misconduct that is also a violation of criminal law may also be subject to disciplinary review and action by the Office of Student Conduct (as outlined in the Student Code of Conduct).

Forms of Academic Dishonesty:

- 1. <u>Cheating</u>: Deception in which a student misrepresents that he/she has mastered information on an academic exercise that he/she has not learned, giving or receiving aid unauthorized by the instructor on assignments or examinations. Examples: unauthorized use of notes for a test; using a "cheat sheet" on a quiz or exam; any alteration made on a graded test or exam which is then resubmitted to the teacher;
- 2. <u>Plagiarism</u>: Careless or deliberate use of the work or the ideas of another; representation of another's work, words, ideas, or data as your own without permission or appropriate acknowledgment. Examples: copying another's paper or answers, failure to identify information or essays from the internet and submitting or representing it as your own; submitting an assignment which has been partially or wholly done by another and claiming it as yours; not properly acknowledging a source which has been summarized or paraphrased in your work; failure to acknowledge the use of another's words with quotation marks;
- 3. <u>Collusion</u>: When more than one student or person contributes to a piece of work that is submitted as the work of an individual;
- 4. Conspiracy: Agreeing with one or more persons to commit an act of academic/scholastic dishonesty; and
- 5. <u>Multiple Submission</u>: Submission of work from one course to satisfy a requirement in another course without explicit permission. Example: using a paper prepared and graded for credit in one course to fulfill a requirement and receive credit in a different course.

PVAMU's General Statement on the Use of Generative Artificial Intelligence Tools in the Classroom Generative Artificial Intelligence (GAI), specifically foundational models that can create writing, computer code, and/or images using minimal human prompting, are increasingly becoming pervasive. Even though ChatGPT is one of the most well-known GAIs currently available, this statement includes any and all past, current, and future generations of GAI software. Prairie View A&M University expects that all work produced for a grade in any course, be it face-to-face or virtual, will be the sole product of a student's endeavors to meet those academic goals. However, should an instructor permit their students to use artificial intelligence as a resource or tool, students must not substitute the substance of their original work with the results of using such GAI tools. This clearly violates the <u>University's Administrative Guidelines on Academic Integrity</u> and its underlying academic values.

Nonacademic Misconduct

The university respects the rights of instructors to teach and students to learn. Maintenance of these rights requires campus conditions that do not impede their exercise. Campus behavior that interferes with either (1) the instructor's ability to conduct the class, (2) the ability of other students to profit from the instructional program, or (3) campus behavior that interferes with the rights of others will not be tolerated. An individual engaging in such disruptive

behavior may be subject to disciplinary action. The Office of Student Conduct will adjudicate such incidents under nonacademic procedures.

Sexual Misconduct

Class Attendance Policy (See the University Online Catalog for Full Attendance Policy)

Prairie View A&M University requires regular class attendance. Attending all classes supports the full academic development of each learner, whether classes are taught with the instructor physically present or via distance learning technologies such as interactive video and/or the Internet. Excessive absenteeism, whether excused or unexcused, may result in a student's course grade being reduced or in the assignment of a grade of "F." Absences are accumulated beginning with the first day of class during regular semesters and summer terms. Each faculty member will include the University's attendance policy in each course syllabus.

Makeup Work for Legitimate Absences

Prairie View A&M University recognizes that there are a variety of legitimate circumstances in which students will miss coursework and that accommodations for makeup work will be made. If a student's absence is **excused**, the instructor must either provide the student an opportunity to make up any quiz, exam, or other work contributing to the final grade or provide a satisfactory alternative by a date agreed upon by the student and instructor. Students are encouraged to work with instructors to complete makeup work before known scheduled absences (University-sponsored events, administrative proceedings, etc.). Students are responsible for planning their schedules to avoid excessive conflicts with course requirements.

Absence Verification Process

All non-athletic absences (e.g., Medical, Death/Funeral, Court/Legal-related, etc.) for which a student seeks to obtain a valid excuse must be submitted to the Dean of Students/Office of Student Conduct, with supporting documentation,

for review and verification. Please use the Online Reporting Forms to access/complete/submit the Request for a University Excused Absence form for an excuse. Upon receipt, a staff member will verify the documentation and provide an official university excuse, if applicable. Student Academic Appeals Process

Authority and responsibility for assigning grades to students rest with the faculty. However, in those instances where students believe that miscommunication, errors, or unfairness of any kind may have adversely affected the instructor's assessment of their academic performance, the student has a right to appeal by the procedure listed in the University Online Catalog and by doing so within thirty days of receiving the grade or experiencing any other problematic academic event that prompted the complaint.

* Some courses may require remote proctoring. At this time only Chromebooks, laptops, and desktops running Windows or Mac work with our proctoring solution, but iPads are not compatible. Most other applications will work with Android or Apple tablets and smartphones.

Participants should have a basic proficiency of the following computer skills:

- Sending and receiving email
- A working knowledge of the Internet
- Microsoft Word (or a program convertible to Word)
- Acrobat PDF Reader
- Windows or Mac OS
- · Video conferencing software (Zoom)

Netiquette (online etiquette)

Students are expected to participate in all discussions and virtual classroom chats as directed. Students are to be respectful and courteous to others on discussion boards. Foul or abusive language will not be tolerated. Do not use ALL CAPS for communicating to others AS IT CAN BE INTERPRETED AS YELLING. Avoid slang terms such as "wassup?" and texting abbreviations such as "u" instead of "you." Limit and possibly avoid the use of emoticons. Be cautious when using humor or sarcasm as tone is sometimes lost in an email or discussion post, and the message might be taken seriously or sound offensive.

Video Conferencing Etiquette

When using Zoom, WebEx, or other video conferencing tools, confirm the visible area is tidy, clear of background clutter, inappropriate or offensive posters, and other distractions. Ensure you dress appropriately and avoid using high traffic or noisy areas. Stay muted when you are not speaking and avoid eating/drinking during the session. Before the class session begins, test audio, video, and lighting to alleviate technology issues.

Technical Support

Communication Expectations and Standards

Emails or discussion postings will receive a response from the instructor, usually in less than 48 hours. Urgent emails should be marked as such. Check regularly for responses.

Discussion Requirement

Online courses often require minimal to no face-to-face meetings. However, conversations about the readings, lectures, materials, and other aspects of the course can occur in a seminar fashion. The use of the discussion board will accomplish this. The instructor will determine the exact use of discussion boards.

It is strongly suggested that students type their discussion postings in a word processing application such as Word and save it to their PC or a removable drive before posting to the discussion board. This is important for two reasons:

1) If for some reason your discussion responses are lost in your online course, you will have another copy; 2) Grammatical errors can be greatly minimized by the use of the spell-and-grammar check functions in word processing applications. Once the post(s) have been typed and corrected in the word processing application, copy and paste to the discussion board.

COVID-19 Campus Safety Measures

In accordance with the latest guidelines from the PVAMU Health Services, the following measures are in effect until further notice.

- Students who are ill will be asked to adhere to best practices in public health, such as masking, handwashing, and social distancing, to help reduce the spread of illness across campus.
