Battalion Commander responsible for the supervision and mission accomplishment of a Cadet Command Battalion consisting of 60 Cadets and 6 Cadre with a command operating budget of \$160,000. Establish and implement strategies, policies and control measures and a climate that maximizes actions to optimally market, recruit, enroll, train, develop and retain high quality students in academic disciplines to exceed the assigned commission mission. Perform duties as academic department chairperson; deals with the local and campus communities in areas pertaining to the U.S. Army. Responsible for the battalion's internal management control program, cadet contract and pay entitlements, budget and unit funds. Act as the battalion test control officer and military affairs advisor to officers in the degree completion program. Perform other duties as required in support of the Cadet Command Mission.

Observer Coach/Trainer

Observer Coach/Trainer for battalion executive officers and battalion combat service support elements training on unified land operations in simulated combat situations and scenarios at the National Training Center. Observe, coach and train Battalion XO's and staffs on planning and executing sustainment operations in support of a Brigade Combat Team. Provide lessons learned through formal battalion-level After Action Reviews (AARs). Additionally, serve as the OC/T team executive officer for 65 Officers and senior NCOs with primary responsibility for team maintenance, property accountability, administration, and logistics. Responsible for the performance, professional development, and accountability of seven senior captains.

Squadron Executive Officer

Executive Officer for a Cavalry Squadron in an Armored Brigade Combat Team with 5 Cavalry Troops and 500 Soldiers, and vehicles. Responsible for the squadron's readiness to deploy anywhere in the world to conduct reconnaissance and security operations for the Brigade and higher commands. Responsible for coordinating, synchronizing, and directing all squadron staff operations to ensure the organization operates efficiently. Responsible for managing all classes of supply, requisitions, and accountability of MTOE equipment valued in excess of \$185 million. Responsible for managing the squadron's budget in excess of \$5 million. In the absence of the commander, takes command and ensures mission accomplishment.

Squadron Operations Officer

Jalabad, Afghanistan

Operations officer for an Armored Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron composed of five Troops; primary advisor to Squadron Commander on Squadron and above operations. Plans, coordinates, resources, and supervises the execution of all operations. Primary manager and daily organizer of a 28-man operations section. Sets priorities and suspenses, is quality control for all documents produced by the operations section. Recommends the tactical employment of Squadron for Stability/Support, High Intensity Conflict and State Emergency Operations. Leads the staff during the formulation of operational plans. Produces courses of action for each Squadron mission. Supervises the publication of all operations orders and operational message traffic.

Battalion Operations Officer

Serves as the Battalion S3 for a Division Headquarters and Headquarters Battalion with a worldwide contingency mission; composed of six companies to include the 1st Cavalry Division Band and Division Horse Detachment; responsible for the planning synchronization, and execution of training and operations for 900 Soldiers and civilians. Serves as the Commanders principle advisor of all aspects of assigned training events to include objectives, funding, need for outside resources, and calendar integration. Provides oversight of the Battalion Intelligence and Signal Operations.

Brigade Executive Officer

DEC 11 – DEC 12

Fort Hood, Texas

Rear Detachment of a Heavy Brigade Combat Team comprised of two combined arms battalions, one armored reconnaissance squadron, a fires battalion, a brigade support battalion, and a brigade special troops battalion, deployed in support of the Operation Iraqi Freedom. Serve as the commander's principal staff officer and command's principle integrator. Responsible for directing staff task, managing and overseeing staff coordination and special staff officers, and ensure efficient and timely staff actions. Conduct all activities in a manner that demonstrate good stewardship of fiscal, material, and environmental resources. Administer staff support for the readiness of over 600 Soldiers. Assume duties and responsibilities in the absence of the commander.
