

UMA Alumni Corner

Dr. Jaron Swift graduated from Prairie View A&M University in 2008 with a Bachelor's in Biomedical Chemistry and Physics. During his undergrad years, Dr. Swift had innumerable research experiences. He received three NSF Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU) Awards on separate occasions from 2006-2008. Not only was he awarded the PVAMU Undergraduate Medical Academy Scholarship, but he also received departmental scholarships such as the PVAMU Dept. of Physics Scholarship and the PVAMU William E. Reid Chemistry Scholarship.



After graduation, Dr. Swift was awarded a Graduate Research Assistantship at the University of South Florida, where he conducted experimental research related to the palmitoylation of the Ras protein. This protein is important in the field of cancer research, and pertains to cellular growth, survival, and differentiation. He had the opportunity to co-author an abstract entitled, "A Family of Bioactive Lipids Inhibits the *Saccharomyces cerevisiae* Erf2/4 Palmitoyl Acyl Transferase (PAT)." He went on to receive a Ph.D. in physical chemistry at Michigan State University, where he conducted theoretical quantum theory research that focused on the age of White Dwarf stars.

Dr. Swift earned his doctorate in Osteopathy Medicine at Edward Via College of Osteopathic Medicine. He is a General Surgery Specialist in Southfield, MI, and board-certified in pain management by the Academy of Procedural Medicine Board (AAOPM) with training in interventional procedures. Dr. Jaron Swift, DO, works at a private practice, providing diagnosis and management for chronic pain patients suffering from a diverse range of conditions.
