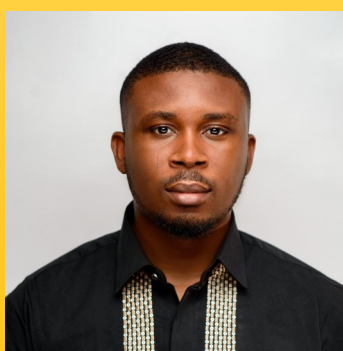

Voting at the Northwest

The Northwest Houston Center is more than just a building that has classes and serves the students. Yes, it is the off campus instructional site for several graduate programs, we also welcome and serve the public. For many years, Harris County has been using the center as a voting site for the Willowbrook and Tomball area residents. Between November 2023 and May 2024, the center has seen over 12,000 voters. Less than half of those voters voted in the Primaries, Uniform, and Primaries Runoff election. This is unfortunate because results of the primary election in Texas shapes how the state is run in the future, which is important for young adults and the children who will become young adults.

Having the Northwest Center as a central location for voting serves as a networking site for community members and students to connect for professional purposes and for those with small businesses to promote to others. When citizens come in the center to vote, they have the opportunity to learn about the wonderful programs available at Prairie View A&M University. Our staff is always eager to share information and direct them to the website. Visitors also visit our library and take advantage of our art gallery. This is great exposure for our university.

With the 2024 presidential election approaching, we are expecting a large turnout of voters. Which in turn can bring more exposure to the center and the great programs Prairie View offers. We encourage everyone to vote in this election and future elections. If you haven't already, the deadline to register to vote for the 2024 presidential election is October 7th. Get out and vote; your vote matters.

NWHC First DBA Graduates

In 2021, Prairie View A&M University College of Business became the first Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) to offer a Doctor of Business Administration (DBA) program. Dr. Brain Lee, Professor and Executive Director of the program began working to get program approval in 2016. The program was later approved by the Higher Education Coordinating Board of Texas, and started the first cohort in Fall 2021. The cohort began with 9 students who wanted to improved their knowledge for potential advancement in their current area of expertise. On August 10, 2024 all 9 students that started the program together, finished together.

Prairie View A&M University was proud to announce the graduation of its first-ever Doctor of Business Administration (DBA) cohort. The cohort included a group of accomplished professionals who have demonstrated exceptional dedication, scholarship, and leadership. These graduates have not only achieved a significant personal milestone but have also paved the way for future generations of business leaders. These graduates embarked on their DBA journey with diverse motivations, ranging from personal fulfillment to professional advancement. They all agree that the program's blend of academic rigor, practical relevance, and supportive community was instrumental in their success. We asked a few members of the inaugural cohort to give some feedback about their experience, dissertation topic, and motivation for choosing PVAMU DBA program. And this is what they had to say:

Dr. Fred Washington, why did you choose the PVAMU DBA program?

As a graduate of PV College of Business I understood the quality of what the program would have and the value of being AACSB accredited would bring in terms of credibility.

What was your dissertation topic, and why was it significant to you?

My title was “WHAT ARE THE POTENTIAL DRIVERS OF NIL PERCEPTION AMONG STUDENT-ATHLETES?” As a former athletic administrator I recognized the dynamic impact NIL would have on college sports and hoped to be on the ground floor in helping future athletes find information that helps them make good choices.

Dr. Akili Cooper, why did you choose the PVAMU DBA program?

Pursuing a Doctorate in Business Administration at Prairie View A&M University allowed me to engage with a unique academic environment and community that has a rich history. The combination of its status as a Historically Black College and University (HBCU) along with its location in Houston, a vibrant economic hub, offering a wealth of resources, networking opportunities, and cultural experiences was very attractive.

What was your dissertation topic, and why was it significant to you?

My dissertation topic focused on the peer-to-peer digital economy more specifically the short-term housing rental platform Airbnb and the role that race plays in consumer behavior. The topic was significant to me first due to my experience as an Airbnb host in Washington, D.C. where I live. I was also interested in researching the contributions of African Americans to business models that birthed what we now recognize as global game changers. Many of the digital platforms that exist today were birthed out the struggle of the African American experience and historical and current contributions and challenges need to be recognized and examined.

Dr. Tyishia Goldsberry, why did you choose the PVAMU DBA program?

I chose the PVAMU DBA program because of its strong reputation in combining academic rigor with practical, real-world application. The program's focus on leadership and innovation aligned perfectly with my career aspirations and entrepreneurial goals. Additionally, its flexibility was a significant factor; it allowed me to maintain my full-time employment while advancing my education, which was essential for balancing my professional and academic commitments.

What was your dissertation topic, and why was it significant to you?

My dissertation topic was “Social Media Influencers: The Effects of Information Richness and Follower Size on Purchase Intent.” This topic was significant to me as it merged my interests in marketing and digital platforms, offering insights that are directly applicable to my business ventures in social media marketing.



We want to thank all of the DOB Program graduates for taking the time to share their experiences with us. We wish them all well and look forward to the great thing they will continue to do to represent this university in excellence.

Join us in congratulating Brittany on her remarkable achievement!

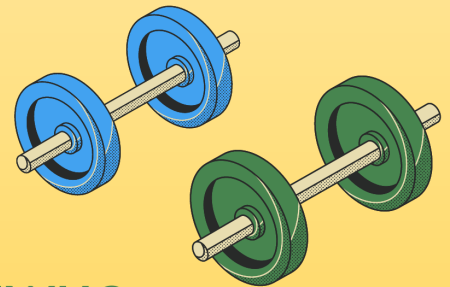
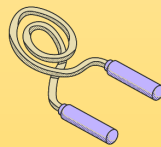

NWHC Fitness Center

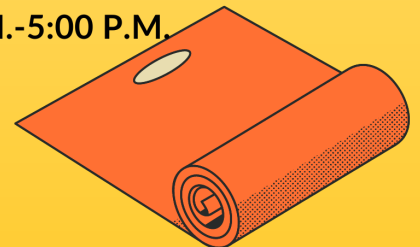
