Communication Expectations and Standards:

Emails or discussion postings will receive a response from the instructor, usually in less than 48 hours. Urgent emails should be marked as such. Check regularly for responses.

Discussion Requirement:

Online courses often require minimal to no face-to-face meetings. However, conversations about the readings, lectures, materials, and other aspects of the course can take place in a seminar fashion. This will be accomplished by the use of the discussion board. The exact use of discussion will be determined by the instructor.

It is strongly suggested that students type their discussion postings in a word processing application and save it to their PC or a removable drive before posting to the discussion board. This is important for two reasons: 1) If for some reason your discussion responses are lost in your online course, you will have another copy; 2) Grammatical errors can be greatly minimized by the use of the spell-and-grammar check functions in word processing applications. Once the post(s) have been typed and corrected in the word processing application, it/they should be copied and pasted to the discussion board.

RESEARCH PAPER FOR GEOG 3723

1. CONTENT

Thesis is clearly developed. Presents and critiques a comprehensive set of contrary points of view. Presents substantial evidence using multiple and varied sources. All key aspects of the subject matter should be addressed.

2. WRITING

Thesis is clearly stated. Consistently uses complete sentences and complex sentence structures to develop concepts and principles. Writing errors are rare or inconsequential.

3. ORGANIZATION

Consistently uses topic sentences to begin each paragraph. The writer develops the topic sentence in each paragraph. The paper has logical flow of ideas and smooth transitions between paragraphs.

4. RESEARCH AND REFERENCE

Appropriate research support is provided consistently throughout the work. In-text and **bibliographic references** are entirely consistent with accepted style practices in Social Sciences.

Example

Introduction

Introduce the reader to the country. (One can write on a general background of the country.) You should also state why you selected that specific country. Give reasons for your choice. State what the paper will address and how. Why does the paper deal with such topics?

Note

A good geography paper should have some maps or even graphs where applicable. Your paper should be organized along the topics we discuss for each region.

- 2. Identify a country you will discuss in your paper
- 3. Do a detailed study of country using the following topics
